



Joint Commission Reiterates Importance of Removing Barriers to Mental Health Care for Staff

We have passed the one-year mark of the COVID-19 public health emergency, and health care staff continue to deal with the serious toll this pandemic has taken on their mental health .

The Joint Commission believes it is critical to remind health care organizations to take steps to remove barriers preventing clinicians from seeking mental health care services. It was well-documented prior to the pandemic that clinicians fear seeking mental health treatment because of concerns related to professional repercussions, specifically because questions about their mental health history may be asked during the credentialing and licensing process. ask about a clinician's history of mental health conditions or treatment. The Joint Commission strongly encourages organizations currently
